roud to be a "Key West Conch," island native Nancy Rose Cooper left the famous southernmost point at age 18 to study at the University of Florida. She practiced interior design for 25 years, in Dallas, Seattle and Orlando. Having returned home a couple years ago, she's happy to be reliving her fond memories of Christmas celebrations on the island.

"Us kids, we always wanted it to be cold so we could wear our new sweaters," she recalls, noting the temperature would only go as low as about 60. When she was very young, and the undeveloped Keys still had a small population, her family and others would make the 30-mile drive to Pine Key to cut their Christmas trees each year. And though it was years before the start of the popular Key West Lighted Boat Parade, Rose remembers participating in the traditional holiday parades down Duval Street.

"Key Westers love their parades," says Cooper, whose Christmas celebrations centered around food. From a family of Scottish descent, with over two centuries of presence in the Caribbean, she had an interesting mix

of traditions.

"So, a lot of their food was Scottish and also Caribbean," says Cooper, recalling meals for Christmas and other special occasions.

"My grandmother was known for her bread pudding, which was made with Cuban bread with layers of guava embedded in it, so it was like a blend of cultures. You baked it with a meringue on top of it, and it melted in your mouth. The locals called it 'the queen of all


puddings.' It would take her the whole day to make the dish, and it was quite elegant."

Her grandfather had family in Nassau and at Christmas would fly over to the Abacos for green turtles to bring home for turtle steaks. "That was their traditional Christmas Eve meal, served on a platter with white rice and green peas. And there was always a pot of pigeon peas, like the equivalent of good luck for New Year's, but they served it on Christmas."

AWKS CAY AT DUCK KEY • Nothing beats celebrating the holiday season with Santa Claus in flip flops at Hawks Cay Resort, where special holiday programming and themed events for adults only or the entire family will have everyone ready to tuck in for visions of sugarplums.

A big draw for kids and adults alike is the resort's Dolphin Connection program, offering varied levels of interaction with bottlenose dolphins, from observing on the sidelines for free to dolphin trainer for a day for \$329.

"We're the only resort in North America that gives guests the opportunity to view dolphins on site in their natural habitat," says Wilner Henry, marketing manager and a native of the Keys.

Having been completely devastated during Hurricane Irma, the recently rebuilt Hawks Cay has a special respect for first responders and each year honors military, fire and rescue, law enforcement and all medical personnel with its annual Heroes Salute program. Running late August to late November, the Heroes Salute includes special rates starting at \$109/night, special discounts on resort activities and weekly tribute events. **SGL**
